Raising Responsible Children

How capable are our kids? I'm not talking about their math ability or how well they throw a football. Can our kids fend for themselves? Can they operate a vacuum cleaner? Cook a meal? Lodge a complaint? Speak to an adult on their own behalf? Hammer a nail? Change a light bulb?

Many kids today live a life of entitlement. Our kids feel that something is owed to them. Very little is asked of them in terms of responsibilities at home. I have two teenage boys at home. Taking responsibility for one's actions is a common topic of discussion in our house. I know in my house, I often think that it's much easier to do a job myself, especially if I want it done right (or my interpretation of the way I think it should be

Consequently, instead of teaching my kids responsibility...I contribute to this problem. My kids have very few responsibilities in the real scheme of things (that is my fault), like most teenagers, my boys run the full spectrum of being very helpful, caring, respectful young men and other times they morph into some type of slob-like, self-absorbed creatures from Hell.

All parents would love to raise responsible children, kids who will clean up after themselves, do that help one to be successful. However, most people view those qualities as a luck of the draw type of occurrence. Know that teaching kids responsibility takes a long time. Don't expect sudden miracles. Continue to talk and teach about responsibility as your child grows. I need to take my own advice.

We need to make sure our children feel the consequences of not taking responsibility (instead of you feeling the consequences). For example, if your child refuses to place his clothes in the hamper to be washed, leaves them on the floor of his room. Shut the door. Don't wash the clothes. When your child panics about not having clean clothes, show him the way to the washer and dryer. Resist the temptation to rescue your kids when they suffer the consequences of not taking responsibility. If your teenager calls from school in the middle of winter wanting a ride home because she's cold and she didn't wear

her out (unless, of course, it could be a life threatening situation). Something as simple as a walk in cold,

brisk weather can teach a child the benefits of wearing a coat in the

As parents we need to talk less. Kids often refuse to take responsibility because they know we will keep reminding them of what needs to be done. Be clear that you'll give ONE reminder, and then it's up to them. Lead by example. Remember that lessons in responsibility always start with you! If your child hears you saying one thing and then doing the opposite, your kids will be more likely to follow your example rather than follow

When a problem occurs at home - a sink overflowing, a broken bottle, the cable is out, the blender blows the circuit - involve your children in the solution. They might be too young to handle broken glass, but you can talk to them about the importance of finding every shard so that no one gets hurt and teach them the trick of shining a flashlight on the surface to spot fragments you might have missed. Show them where the circuit breaker box is and how you can tell for others without being asked, and do the extras if a circuit has flipped. Allow them to be part of
