Music Appreciation

I'm not very musically inclined. I cannot play tracurricular acany musical instruments and I cannot sing very well. The extent of my musical participation ends with me listening to Bruce Springsteen on the radio. That said, I have come to appreciate our middle school and high school bands programs. Our band, under the direction of Mrs. Tianna Doe, recently performed at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida. This could be a once in a lifetime event for many of our students.

The band program provides many opportunities for our students to learn and grow. Our students who are involved with the band program learn about the arts, and performing as artists. Music is an essential part of a wellrounded and complete education. The music program allows our students explore realities, relationships and ideas that cannot be conveyed simply in words or numbers. Also, the music program allows for innovative problem solving that students can apply to other academic disciplines at the same time.

Researchers have studied the benefits of music education for decades, consistently finding strong correlations between music and academic achievement. For example, positive results have been noted in standardized tests. According to one study that tracked more than 25,000 middle and high school students, music-making students get higher marks on standardized tests than those who have little or no music involvement.

Not all benefits derived from a music education are academic. Many studies have found that involvement in music programs leads to positive personal, social and motivational effects. Studies have demonstrated that the arts significantly boost student involvement in ex-

tivities, student government, reduces behavior problems, and increase the odds that students will go on to graduate from both

high school and a four-year college. In short, music helps improve the overall quality of a young person's life.

Music education will help with memory. Even when performing with sheet music, music students are constantly using their memory to perform. The skill of memorization can serve students well in education and beyond. Music students learn to improve their work. Learning music promotes craftsmanship, and students learn to want to create good work instead of mediocre work. This desire can be applied to all subjects of study. Music students stay engaged in school. An enjoyable subject like music can keep kids interested and participating in school. Student musicians are likely to stay in school to achieve in other subjects. Music students have greater levels of self-confidence. With encouragement from teachers and parents, students playing a musical instrument can build pride and confidence. Musical education is also likely to develop better communication for students.

Nearly everyone enjoys music, whether by listening to it, singing, or playing an instrument. The band program is doing great things for our kids... and maybe, just maybe one of our students will end up as a member of Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band.


Bangor Middle School

Welcome back from Spring Break! I hope everyone feels rejuvenated and ready for the home stretch of the 2015-2016 school year. Last week the middle school kicked off the M-Step test as previously mentioned in the last Viking Press. The 8th graders began the testing sessions on Tuesday, April 12th. The 5th graders will be testing next beginning Thursday, April 21st. The 6th and 7th graders will be tested in May. I can say that it was a great start. Attendance rates were high and students seemed very confident heading into the first two sessions. The high school and middle school welcomed the Flying Aces professional Frisbee team to help motivate students to be successful. Thank you to Brian Hayes and his team for such a magnificent show.











In Ms. Squire's class, students were learning about blood typing. 7th grade students are required to understand that cells are the basic units to all living organisms, their composition (similarities/differences of animal and plant), and in multicellular organisms cells comprise subsystems. One component is talking about specialized cells. Blood cells were used as one example. For more than 10 years, Mrs. Vadonna Jackson from the American Red Cross has come in and performed blood typing for the students who wanted to participate. Each participant was able to see how their blood type is determined and received their results within a couple of minutes. Students were then given a sticker to wear with their blood type. While the blood typing was going on, another representative from the ARC did a presentation on blood cells. Upon comple-

tion of the blood typing, we gathered data and graphed 🔤 the different blood types to be displayed for the students. This not only gave students a first-hand look at a specialized cells, but allowed the students to get information on a career in nursing/health care, etc.

Bangor Band Goes to Disney


